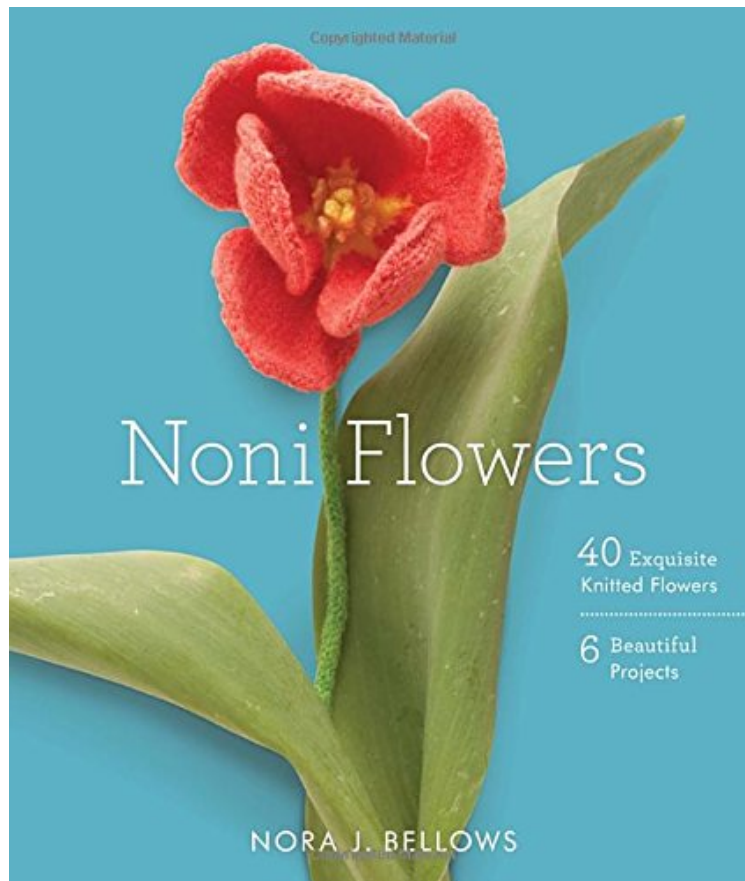

Beautifully photographed throughout, the knitted flowers really do look like the real thing. Bellows starts by showing how different yarn gauges, from lace weight to heavy Icelandic wool, can enable you to make up each flower pattern in any number of ways - from embellishment of a shawl or tote bag, to a stand-alone decoration. There's a nifty description - again with lovely close-up photography - of the "anatomy of a knitted flower" detailed instructions for the construction of same. Each pattern includes suggested yarns, but there's no required gauge - you can make a flower larger or smaller depending on the yarn you use. The photographs also show how each flower looks, depending on whether you choose to felt or not - some patterns, such as cherry blossom dogwood, look more realistic when felted; others, like fuchsia daffodil, are prettier when not felted but knitted in a lightweight gauge. Instructions for different felting methods are also included. Lots of close-ups for special techniques.
