One to admire and one to try your skills on...50 drawings from Otto Wagner's *Einige Skizzen, Projekte und ausgeführte Bauwerke* (Sketches, Projects and Executed Buildings), each on its own page, not perforated. Churches, museums, monuments, a bridge, a tunnel - a wide variety of Wagner's designs over his career. (Full list of subjects at the end of this review). His originals look to be in many media - pen and ink for most of them but also some in pencil, and are a range of complexity from the simple to ones that look almost like etchings or scratchboard. No color key though to help out. Searching for Otto Wagner in Google Image Search should give you a lot of ideas on both what his

drawings looked like (often quite colorful!) as well as the actual buildings that survive (also often quite colorful!). A very nice gift for someone interested in coloring somewhat complex images, or someone into design or architecture and not necessarily into coloring. Excellent value for the price.
