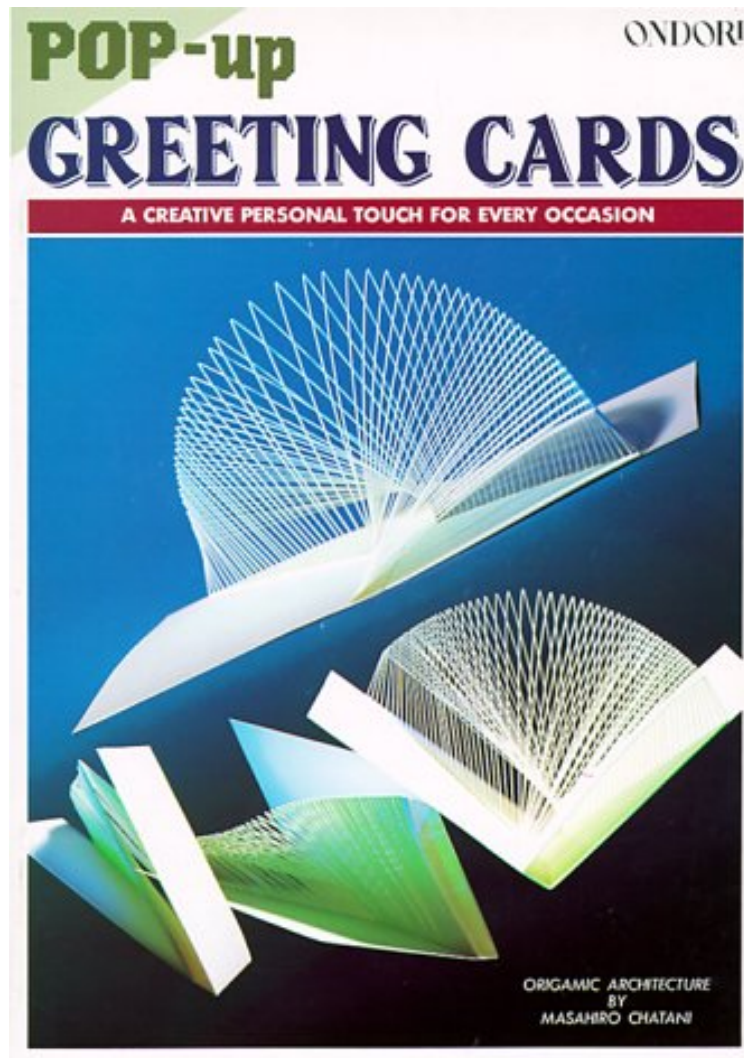

Ones that give you templates that you can trace on paper and cut, and ones that teach you the theory and give directions. Both are good for their purpose. But for just starting out, getting a book with the blueprints gives you immediate satisfaction and lets you learn before you have to get into the theory to design them yourself. This is by far the best for just jumping in feet first and cutting to see if the art works for you. I liked this book

Wonderful Tutorial for Origamic Architects By Cacao Nut Professor Masahiro Chatani has laid out most of the basics for OA with Pop-up Greeting Cards, Starting with simple straightline 90 degree cards to complex multi-layered cards that open 180 degrees. With the exception of London's Big Ben Bridge, most are basic shapes designs you can apply to your own creations designs of local structures. There are even some 90 degree floral designs by his student OA master Keiko Nakazawa. All patterns are included (make copies share!!) on thicker, bristol like card stock are probably close to the "Kent Paper" he refers to in his books. Enjoy! However, the instructions and illustrations seem out of sequence or that a step is missing. If you use this book, you can make some cool-looking things, but don't be in a hurry.
